What did you say? Journalism Studies for Sámis?

- Who are the Sámis?
 - Indigenous peoples in four countries
- How many are we?
 - About 100 000 may be more
- How many Sámi groups?
 - Ten language groups. + inland, sea, forest, river, city
- How many speakers?
 - 30–35 000. 90 % North–Sámi
- Are there Sámi media?
 - Radio, TV, newspapers, magazines, internet

How do establish programs for Sámi and Indigenous people?

- Have to have possibilities for such innovation
- Need in the society for the education must be recogniced
- 2. Inside: Idealism
- Outside: Support from the academic community
- 4. Self-determination in the indigenous society or supportive policy on macro level
- 5. Institutions where the innovation might take place

Sámi media - expansive branch

- Paradigm change in Sámi policy
 - "from assimilatory to supportive of Sámi people and their languages. These changes are also visible in the media sector as both subsidies for printed media has increased, time on ear has increased both for radio and TV, and the number of employees in Sámi media houses has expanded."

- **1990 60**
- **▶** 2015 − 200

It looks like journalism. It is about Journalism

- Aim of Bachelor Program is to educated professional Journalists
- Journalism is Global:
 - Journalism theory, journalist role, methods, ethics, editorial work experience etc.
- Sámi/indigenous:
 - Language and Content of many subjects.
 - Sámi and Indigenous Society Studies (10 ECTS), Indigenous People in National Media (5 ECTS), Storytelling – Indigenous Peoples Oral Tradition (10 ECTS), Basic Principles for Indigenous Journalism and Minority Media (10 ECTS), Indigenous and Sámi public sphere (5 ECTS).

Idealism

- Student of journalism, Magne Ove Varsi, first mentioned establishing of Sámi Journalism Studies in 1983.
- Magne Ove Varsi was charged with overseeing the plan
- The Sámi journalism studies was established as a 3 year pilot project - Mr. Varsi ran the project

An institution were innovations could happen

- Sámi University College
 - Mainly a teacher training college with special responsibility for Sámi Language Studies in the beginning
- A Norwegian college according to laws, regulations and fundings.
 - But Sámi laguage in all activities included administration and teaching
 - Develope Programs
 - Lobbying for new studies to start

The good helpers

- Sámi academics were not and are not available for all possitions and teaching
 - Needed help from other adademics and other Journalism Studies
 - Adjunct Professors, guest lectures, network of Scandinavian Journalism Studies
- Now we do mostly manage on our own for the Bachelor Studies
 - Help from the Sámi Society. Experts in different fields

Why an International Master of Indigenous Journalism?

- On the global leve: Increasing demand for research and statistics for indigenous media & journalism.
- International co-operation creating more indigenous media options; requiring knowledge and networks.
- Indigenous journalism lacks centre for education and research.

- ▶ 16 Indigenous Television Broadcasters' cooperation. Maori. Sámi, Canada, Taiwan, Hawaii.
- «We will develop into the Indigenous People's CNN»



Need of a Master in Ind. Journalism

- An expanding indigenous media environment requires experts and policy makers with indigenous media expertise
- International co-operation creating more indigenous media options; requiring knowledge and networks.
- Indigenous journalism lacks centre for education and research.

Highlevel discussions

- Need for more education in the field of journalism discussed for a long time, e.g. in relation to UN conferences on Indigenous media (1998 in Madrid and 2000 in New York).
- Preparation process started at Sámi allaskuvla. Approved by NOKUT in 2012.
 - Norwegian Agency for Quality Assurance in Education, an independent expert body under the Ministry of Education and Research
- Discussions, hearings and presentations with and for Sámi and other indigenous media 2008-2013 (including WITBN and WINHEC).

Aim of the Programme

To provide indigenous (and other) communities with media professionals, academics and policy makers in the field of media in an Indigenous and multicultural setting



Basic info



- 120/90 ECTS, 2 years (3−4 semesters)
- 15 students every three years, of which about 5 international
- Thesis can be either30 study points or 60study points

Programme Language


- Possible to meet the course requirements in English

- 2000 Journalism Study in Guovdageaidnu
- From 2008 (2012) Bachelor Program
- 2015 January Master of indigenous journalism. 14 students.
 - Since 2000: 38 candidates of Sámi journalism
 - 12 bachelors of Sámi journalism
 - 2013–16: Five students in Bachelor Program

Why did it take so long?

- Why couldn't Sámis establish Journalism Studies as soon as the need was identified within the Society?
- Lack of self-determination in Sámi Society.
- Lack of institutions
- Lack of resources

Who might establish a Master?

- Same problem as for our Bachelor
- Lack of Institutions
- Lack of Resources
- Lack of educated indigenous people?
 - May be not if we work together
- Again media is to step a head of academica
